Community Grants Program Recipients Announced

The Scott County Community Foundation has awarded \$58,000 in grants to several local agencies during its 2012 Community Grants Program, announced grants committee chairperson Hank Jentzen. The recipients will be formally recognized at the Foundation's "Thanks4Giving" fall dinner this

November. The organizations, the

amount awarded and the purpose of the request are:

• Big Brothers Big Sisters of Southeast Indiana (Scott County program), \$4,000 to allow more students to be matched in schoolbased mentoring program

• Blessings in a Backpack, \$5,000 to provide food to elementary aged children every weekend during the school year

• CASA (Court Appointed Special Advocates), \$3,000 to assist with operating expenses for program that serves abused and neglected children of Scott County

• City of Scottsburg Police Department, \$3,200 to purchase equipment for in-car computer initiative, allowing police officers to patrol longer and respond to calls quicker

• Englishton Park, \$3,000 to provide assistance for the summer camp program

• Lexington Good Faith Preschool, \$5,750 to provide free pre-

school services to children of Lexington Township

• LifeSpan Resources, \$1,350 for a prescription assistance program for elderly and disabled clients

• O.V.O. Head Start, \$2,200 for Minds-in-Motion equipment to benefit preschool students

• Reach Out and Read Indiana, \$1,000, to distribute books to children ages 6 months through 5 years through pediatric visits at Foundation Family Medicine and Scottsburg Family Healthcare in Scott County

• Scott County Partnership, \$4,000 to provide food for the Clearinghouse

• Scott County Partnership, \$1,750 to provide assistance for GED testing fees

\$2,000 for the Circles Campaign, a program working to eliminate poverty • Scott County Partnership, \$2,500 to provide field trips and supplies for the summer EDGE program

In addition, the Board of Directors awarded \$19,331 from the Scott County CAPE Educational Endowment Fund to the Scott County Partnership to continue educational initiatives.

f "As in years past, the grants committee had a difficult time deciding which organizations to award grants," said Jentzen. "With over \$137,000 in requests, it was an extremely competitive process and there were so many deserving projects."

The grants were made possible from the Addie Mae Graham Memorial Fund, Lauren Graham Memorial Fund, Hazel and Lowell Lowry Sr. Memorial Fund, L.L. and Juanita Lowry Unrestricted Fund, John and Janice Martin Unrestricted Fund, Dr. William and Diann Scott Unrestricted Fund, Scott County Immediate Response Fund, Scott County Memorial Fund, the Community Enrichment Fund and a donation from Monsanto Fund.

In addition, funding for CASA, LifeSpan Resources and the Clearinghouse was made possible, in part, from the Donald R. Collins Sr. Family Fund. Through their membership in the Forever Tree Society, earnings from the family's fund are able to support specific charitable projects in the community.

SCCF Receives "Good Housekeeping Seal" for Community Foundations

We are proud to announce the completion of the Standards Reconfirmation process in meeting Ethical and Operational Standards for Indiana Community Foundations. Because of Indiana's reciprocal agreement with the Community Foundations National Standards Board, this makes us automatically in compliance with National Standards for U.S. Community Foundations as well. The National Standards for U.S. Community Foundations program requires community foundations to document their policies for donor services, investments, grantmaking, and administration. The program is designed to provide quality assurance to donors, as well as to their legal and financial advisors. The Scott County Community Foundation originally earned the designation five years ago. Community foundations must

be reconfirmed in compliance with the National Standards five years after their original confirmation.

Developed in the spirit of accountability, transparency and continuous self -improvement, National Standards for U.S. Community Foundations are evidence that community foundations seek excellence for their communities and their donors.

YGC Awards Grants For Youth-Related Projects

The Scott County Youth Grantmaking Council awarded over \$2,600 in grants to youth-related projects in the community at an annual dinner held June 4 at First Southern Baptist Church.

Austin Christian Preschool received \$597 for its "Byte-ing into Technology" project. They will purchase new computers and educational software for preschool students in order to create engaging classroom experiences and better prepare them for school.

Austin Middle School received \$200 for its "Social Skills in the Community" project. Lee Anne Hahn's students will enjoy restaurant outings to learn how to handle money and interact with community members, giving them socializing experiences.

Blessings in a Backpack received \$640 for the "Blessings in a Backpack" program. Backpacks of food will be provided to children every weekend during the school year.

Lexington Good Faith Preschool received \$750 for its preschool. The funds will be used to help with transportation costs for the preschool, which is provided free for Lexington Township students.

Scott County Soccer Club received \$175 for its "Helping Scott County Youth Reach Their Goal" program. This will provide matching dollars for scholarships so youth can play soccer.
