# Foundation Report

Encouraging, engaging, empowering.

“This is the story of a little room over the pizza place at 315 Chesnut Street, the modest first-floor bedroom in Talinn, Estonia, and a dusty basement at 1406 35th Street. It is the story of the old dining room table at 25th and Hoffman Avenue. The South-bound bus barreling down I-95 and the second floor above the strip mall at Roble and El Camino...It is the story of where every great idea begins. Where those with endless vision and an equal amount of audaciousness believed that they had the power to do more. Time and time again.”



The words above, reaching into the homes of millions of individuals across the world, recently aired as part of Dell’s “The Power To Do More” media campaign. Beginnings, as the advertisement is titled, showcases the humble beginnings of some of the “world’s great success stories.” For those familiar with both the advertisement and history of the Foundation (which appeared in the 2012 Annual Report in commemoration of the Foundation’s 15th year of giving and service in Scott County), the advertisement likely served as a reminder of the humble beginning of the Foundation in 1997 by a small group of visionary individuals who gathered to discuss how they could bring a community foundation to Scott County.

While 2012 marked the 15th year of service and giving in Scott County, 2013 represented forward progress into (and the beginning of) the Foundation’s next 15 years of service and giving. For some, envisioning the next 15 years may prompt feelings of anxiety and uncertainty. Others may embrace this future period with excitement. While impossible to predict everything the future may hold, reflection of past events and developments occurring during the last decade-and-a-half remind us of the ever-growing necessity to be perceptive of community needs, purposeful with our resources, and proactive with our decisions.

As the global landscape continues to change, the need for local education and training opportunities has increased more than ever. Within the next 15 years, every student in Scott County, whether currently enrolled in pre-school or nearing high school graduation, will have reached the age to graduate from high school and enter into post-secondary education or vocational training opportunities. Many will likely seek some sort of support, whether financial, human, or automated, to assist in the journey. Additionally, many currently in the workforce or seeking employment will likely seek opportunities to gain or enhance employable skills.

To promote success and provide benefit (whether directly or indirectly) to current and future Scott County residents, the Foundation continues to purposefully and proactively support educational development and attainment, from early childhood through adulthood, as areas of high priority. In addition to over \$101,000 awarded in educational scholarships during 2013, the Foundation has partnered in the Education Matters Southern Indiana initiative (which aims to provide opportunities to adult learners), supported local school guidance counselors and junior/senior high school students through the creation of an Educational Programs Coordinator position at Scottsburg Middle School and a Career & College Counselor position at Austin and Scottsburg High Schools, while also taking the lead to expand the Dolly Parton Imagination Library initiative (which aims to impact the area of early childhood literacy by delivering free books every month into the homes of Scott County children from birth through age five) and investing in many community-based programs through the Community Grants program (which I encourage you to read more about by visiting the Foundation online at [ScottCountyFoundation.org](http://ScottCountyFoundation.org)).

The Scott County Community Foundation is a fan of success stories, and we thank you for your continuing to serve as a significant part of ours—and for enabling the success stories of countless others. As we continue the drive into the next 15 years, we do so with confidence gained from the many great ideas that have developed, and lives that have been impacted. We look forward to you joining us in the power to do more, time and time again.

# Why Give Through the Community Foundation?



There are several advantages of charitable and philanthropic giving through the Scott County Community Foundation, including:

**Local Impact.** Our board of directors and committee members are comprised of citizens in our community who are familiar with the needs of Scott County. They identify local issues and award grants where they are needed most in a variety of areas. We also collaborate with many local agencies, sharing resources and the vision for a better community.

**Flexibility.** You may select from many funds we offer, or create your own fund. You may make a gift with cash, or be creative with shares of stock, life insurance, real estate, and more. You may also include the Foundation in your will or trust through a bequest, or as a beneficiary in a life insurance or retirement plan.

**Tax Benefits.** As a public charity, we offer the highest level of tax benefits for charitable giving. Please consult with your financial/tax advisor for details.

**Privacy.** You may choose to have your gifts publically recognized or to remain anonymous. Either way, you have the security of knowing that your personal information will remain confidential.

**Stewardship of Funds.** Our Board, Finance Committee, professional staff and investment managers provide prudent stewardship of donor funds. Because we manage a variety of funds, we can pool investment and administration, providing full services to each fund at a fraction of the cost of administering each separately.

**Lasting Legacy.** The Foundation provides permanence. Your gifts will benefit the agencies and residents of Scott County for generations to come, ensuring your legacy will continue.

## Types of Funds

*You may choose the fund that best meets your charitable intentions.*

**Designated:** These funds are for a school, government agency, or specific 501(c)(3) charity selected by the donor, such as a museum or church.

**Donor Advised:** These funds provide support to qualified charitable organizations or purposes with input from the donor and/or family/representatives.

**Field of Interest:** These funds are for a general field selected by the donor, such as arts, education, healthcare, etc.

**Pass Through:** A “charitable checking” account. A donor may recommend several organizations in which to receive funding. Funds are not invested in the market.

**Scholarship Fund:** These funds are for students to receive assistance for educational expenses. You may place restrictions on the scholarship, and the Foundation’s scholarship committee selects the best candidate, with your advice if you so choose.

**Unrestricted:** You place no restriction on how the fund is to be used, entrusting those decisions to the Board of Directors, now and generations to come.

# New Endowment Funds in 2013



Jayce Ray Stallings loved being with his mom's basketball team, at the baseball diamond, and on vacation with his family. He enjoyed John Deere tractors and was loved by everyone who met him. The son of Julian and Ashley (Peacock) Stallings and brother of Madalyn, he had attended Wesley Chapel United Methodist Church in Austin.

Jayce was just three years old when he tragically died in a drowning accident this past summer. His family is determined to keep his memory alive, and have established the Jayce Ray Stallings Memorial Fund. The scholarship, worth \$1,000, will be awarded to a graduating Austin High School girl who played basketball. Jayce's mom, Ashley, coaches the team, and Jayce was a constant presence during practices and games.

"Yes, it's a privilege because it's money that's going to help pay for our future, but it also gives Jayce an opportunity to be in our future in a way because it's all for him," said senior Megan Smith.

The family has been working hard on fundraisers, including a successful softball tournament, to build the scholarship. The first award will be given this May.

## Dolly Parton Imagination Library



The statistics are startling. The number of Scott County children in poverty is 34%, compared to a state and national average of 22.5%. Our dropout rate is 18.9%, compared to a state rate of 6.3%. At-risk children are 25% more likely to drop out of school, 40% more likely to become a teen parent, 50% more

likely to be placed in special education, 60% more likely to never attend college and 70% more likely to be arrested for a violent crime. States plan the number of jail cells they will need by the number of children not reading on grade level by third grade! About half of our children are entering kindergarten without the necessary literacy skills needed to be successful.

While this may seem bleak, we have partnered with United Way of Scott County to make an impact in this area of early childhood literacy. Brought to Scott County

in January 2013, the Dolly Parton Imagination Library provides a free book, mailed directly to a child's home every month, from birth through age five. There are no income restrictions, so every child who lives in Scott County is eligible.

This highly successful program has already surpassed projected enrollment figures. There were 119 children registered within the first few weeks of announcing the program. There are currently over 370 kids receiving the books, and an additional 44 who have "graduated" from the program when they turned five.

While it only costs \$25 to sponsor a child each year, it takes the entire community's support to sustain this initiative. There have been numerous clubs, organizations and individuals who see the value in getting books in the hands of all children, especially those whose families may not have the means to provide books.

# Grants to the Community

Each year, we invite charitable organizations to submit applications for grants from our unrestricted and field-of-interest funds during our Community Grants Program. This year we awarded over \$103,000 for charitable projects in Scott County. In addition, we awarded over \$48,000 from our donor-advised, designated, and pass-through funds.

# 2013 Lilly Endowment Community Scholar

Lilly Scholars receive 4-year scholarships for tuition expenses plus \$900 for books and related expenses. The committee had many talented students apply this year, and one was chosen. Caitlin Rice, a graduate of Austin High School, is attending IUPUI. The value of her scholarship is worth \$37,766. Lilly Endowment has awarded 32 scholarships through the Scott County Community Foundation since 1998.



"I just recently finished my first semester of college at IUPUI. I learned so much! My first semester really helped me decide what direction I want to go in as far as my major and future career. I am still pursuing my bachelor's degree in social work. Afterward, I would like to receive my master's degree for mental health in social work and work toward my clinical license so that I may be a licensed therapist. I will apply to be in the school of social work this coming semester.

Balancing my social life and academics was sometimes stressful, but I managed to finish the semester with a 4.0 and I could not have been happier. I met a lot of friends this semester from all over the state. I also befriended many professors and Honors College staff.
