

With the news from Lilly Endowment in late 2014 that we were awarded a \$500,000 matching grant opportunity, this past year has been dedicated to sharing the stories about the impact of our grantmaking in the community and seeking to increase those results.

We have been incredibly blessed by grant opportunities from Lilly Endowment, which has made it possible for community foundations to exist in every single county in Indiana, the only state in our nation to claim this honor. Scott County Community Foundation first participated in a Lilly matching grant opportunity in 1997, resulting in 14 endowment funds by the end of our first year of existence. Fast forward 19 years, and we have grown to 85 funds and over \$7 million in assets, all made possible by donors who care about the causes in our community and want to bring solutions.

We envision a community where there are opportunities for all ages to live the best possible life...where no person ever goes hungry....where every child is cared for and has numerous educational and culturally enriching opportunities available...where our community is thriving! As you'll read throughout our annual report, our community supports many causes, and as a community foundation it is our responsibility to assist our donors with their passions, and ensuring their gift will fund their cause for generations to come. New Funds



A new fund to benefit the Englishton Park Summer Camp program will carry on the legacy of "Chief John," a former camp counselor. John Elliott Wittich worked his first summer at Englishton Park in Lexington in 1978. While at Englishton, John found his life's passion—working professionally with children. John graduated from Hanover College in 1979 and for the next 33 years he worked with children with various learning challenges. He became a trusted support for their parents as well.

"Working with children was not just his career, it was his life and passion," said his wife Tami. "Even when he was on vacation, he would carry his clipboard, creating new and meaningful ways to work with the students."

John was diagnosed in April 2015 with colon cancer. John received hundreds of cards and letters from colleagues, parents, friends, and family sending him their hopeful words for recovery and recollections of John's influence in their own lives. Tami decided to contribute the gifts made in memory of John to establish the Chief John Memorial Campership Fund. Earnings from the fund will benefit Englishton Park, so that at-risk youth will continue to receive life-changing experiences that John himself was able to provide when he was a camp counselor there.

"John loved Englishton Park," said Tami. "He would be so proud of the camper scholarship that his family set up to honor him. His memory will live on through this scholarship."

Kathy Nicholson Fund



Kathy Nicholson's love of music and passion for Scottsburg United Methodist Church mission work will be supported through two new funds.

People who knew Kathy and those who attended SUMC have fond memories of her and remember her beautiful singing voice and of her using American Sign Language to interpret songs in the church choir.

Kathy loved to express herself through the gift of music. She loved movie themes, music from old movies, modern musicals,

opera, and MTV. She was also talented in crafting and acting and used them to aid the church during fundraising events.

When Kathy prepared her will, just a few weeks before her passing, it was her request to have two endowment funds set up. One was to assist with the music program at the Scottsburg United Methodist Church and the other to help with mission work in general through church-sponsored mission projects.

Ella Maude McCulloch was involved in mission work of some degree during her entire 90 years of life, and now an endowment fund to benefit missions at Scottsburg United Methodist Church will honor her contributions to others.

Most of the members of the Scottsburg United Methodist

Church vividly remember when Ella Maude would join weeklong group trips to Oklahoma to help build a church. She was also known to take off in her car any given day when there was a disaster close by, or in a neighboring state, to clean debris or anything that she could do to be helpful to those who had a need.

By vocation Ella Maude was a nurse and loved to be a caregiver to people in need. She was a very calm and peaceful person to be around. She showed many the love of Christ through the faithful volunteer work she did in her neighborhood and her church.

Ella Maude was 90 years old when she passed away in 2010. The church chose to gracefully honor her example of love and service to others by establishing an endowment fund in her memory to support mission work and events.

Education Initiatives



Education Matters Southern Indiana ("EMSI") is an initiative of the community foundations that serve Clark, Floyd, Harrison, Scott and Washington counties. Our goal is to increase the educational attainment of adults with some form of post-secondary education but no degree or certification. This represents about 40,000 people in our region, and we have made huge strides over the last few years since we first partnered to address this issue.

Through generous grants from several funders, EMSI is able to share many successes this past year:

- Hired our first executive director, Bridgett Strickler, who has brought a wealth of experience in adult education
- Created a Leadership Table with representatives from Indiana University Southeast, Ivy Tech Community College, WorkOne, One Southern Indiana and Purdue Polytechnic
- Established an online student portal registration at www.educationmatterssi.org, which has resulted in several success stories of adults returning to school
- Created a grassroots Ambassador program to reach more adults through word-of-mouth and presentations
- Created a One-Stop Shop committee of experts from our Leadership Table to help guide students to the appropriate place to finish their schooling
- Launched a public awareness campaign by sharing testimonials and blogs on social media
- Locally, in Scott County, we have assisted four adults through Work One with tuition assistance, and have awarded two scholarships to adult learners

As we continue our efforts in 2016, we look forward to sharing many more success stories and increasing the number of adults who have completed a degree or certification.

Dolly Parton Imagination Library

The Dolly Parton Imagination Library initiative in Scott County continues to show steady growth. It has been three full years since we partnered with United Way of Scott

> County to bring this program to Scott County. Over 15,000 free ageappropriate books have been mailed directly to children's homes each month,

helping to meet our goal of increasing early childhood literacy.

By the end of 2015, there were 576 children registered for the program, plus 262 kids who "graduated" from the program when they turned five. Our community has been very supportive of the program, and along with grants, we have received many donations from individuals, businesses and civic organizations to ensure this program will continue.

"Weston looks forward to receiving his book in the mail each month," says his mom. "He enjoys looking at the pictures and then having it read to him by mommy, daddy and big

brother...individually. It's safe to say that our family are definitely fans of the Dolly Parton Imagination Library."


2015 Lilly Endowment Scholar




